Heartland 2050 World Café focuses on providing opportunities for all

Imagine a training room transformed into a quaint sidewalk café, complete with checkered tablecloths and a gourmet coffee cart. That was the scene greeting Heartland 2050 Executive Committee members at their November meeting. The stage was set for a World Café on the Heartland 2050 Equitable Growth Profile of the Omaha-Council Bluffs region.

The "World Café" is a structured conversational process intended to facilitate open and intimate discussion, and link ideas within a larger group to access the "collective intelligence" or collective wisdom in the room. Participants move between a series of tables where they continue the discussion in response to a set of questions, which are predetermined and focused on specific goals.

Using the World Café format three rounds of questions focused on the following critical issues supported by data from the profile:

1. Shifting demographics within the region indicate increases in population will be fueled by people of color.

2. Within the region a wide disparity by race exists in poverty levels, educational opportunities and attainment, and earning power.

3. Lost economic opportunity due to racial disparity could impact the region's economic viability seriously.

Committee members also suggested future strategies. They include a central idea incorporating a more robust transportation network that provides better access to educational and job opportunities for racially concentrated areas of poverty. The 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan is incorporating feedback from the Executive Committee in its planning processes. This conversation will be continued into 2016 as the Implementation Committees develop strategies and action steps.

Other topics the Heartland 2050 Executive Committee is addressing include:

- Project role for philanthropic community
- Business community involvement
- Opportunity for cultural and racial awareness
- Opportunity to update human resources practices
- Opportunity to build capacity of adult education
- Youth education and guidance

Equity, Inclusivity, Efficiency and Local Control Regional Benefit are the guiding principles of Heartland 2050. Work begins on 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) process with public outreach

What are the transportation needs of the Omaha-Council Bluffs metropolitan area for the next 35 years? MAPA is conducting initial outreach efforts to the community with the goal of answering that very question with the 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP).

The 2050 LRTP takes a comprehensive approach to addressing transportation in the area. It incorporates elements from the Heartland 2050 Regional Vision as well as the studies MAPA has completed during the past five years. The plans, projections, and proposed solutions aim to increase the quality of life for area residents.

The diagram to the right helps illustrate MAPA's planning process and opportunities for public involvement.

This fall staff members are conducting preliminary community outreach. MAPA is asking the public to participate in a survey about long range transportation needs. The survey is available in both English and Spanish at http://mapacog.org/calendar/news/ take-our-transportation-survey/. It will be available through mid-January 2016.

In Spring 2016 MAPA will begin developing the elements of the 2050 LRTP based on the public feedback received through the survey along with data from the Metro Area Travel Improvement Study (MTIS) underway now and the Regional Transit Vision (RTV) developed with Metro Transit in 2014.



Passage of five year funding bill highlights efforts to boost transportation systems in the region

Federal and State efforts to boost transportation in the Omaha-Council Bluffs metropolitan area and the funding for it are moving forward. On December 4, President Obama signed the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act into law.

The five-year transportation bill is the first long-term transportation funding bill passed by Congress in 10 years. Prior to passage of FAST, Congress had passed 36 short-term extensions for transportation funding, according to statistics released by U.S. Transportation Secretary Anthony Foxx. Preliminary figures on how much funding will be allocated to metropolitan areas are encouraging and include yearly increases. The bill includes millions of dollars for bike and pedestrian projects as well. On the state level, Nebraska Department of Roads Director Kyle Schneweis launched an Innovation Task Force for Transportation this fall which will focus on ways that the public and private sectors can work together, provide opportunities to use new technologies and discuss how transportation investments can help Nebraska economically.

Another tool in the works is a comprehensive study of Nebraska's state and local roads system by the Legislature's Transportation and Telecommunications Committee. This study will focus on determining the needs of the state highway system and county and municipal roads, bridge conditions and the current restrictions on and sustainability of funding dedicated to those areas.

Iowa DOT completes its RPA-18 planning review

On November 2, the Iowa Department of Transportation conducted its Planning Review of Regional Planning Affiliation 18 (RPA-18). This type of review takes place every six years and is an opportunity for Iowa DOT to track progress on the transportation planning process taking place within each RPA region.

The Iowa Department of Transportation has designated 18 Regional Planning Affiliations (RPAs) that coordinate regional transportation planning outside the metropolitan areas. MAPA serves as the administrator for RPA-18 and provides professional and planning services for communities within Harrison, Mills, Shelby, and the non-urbanized portion of Pottawattamie County in Southwest Iowa.

MAPA received a favorable review. Major topics of planning review included the development of the next Long Range Transportation Plan, RPA-18's public participation process, and civil rights requirements for all RPAs.

In its final report of the meeting, the Iowa DOT commended MAPA and RPA-18 for

embracing innovative public participation strategies as part of the Heartland 2050 Regional Vision.

Additionally, Iowa DOT recommended that RPA-18 update its Public Participation Plan to match the detailed strategies and outreach activities identified for the MAPA Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO).

The lowa DOT also encouraged RPA-18 to continue developing its new project selection process for the Regional Transportation Improvement Program, an annual listing of significant transportation projects in the region.

MAPA will discuss the final report and Iowa DOT recommendations with the Policy and Technical Committees of RPA-18 during the next several months.

These committees are comprised of representatives from each county (Harrison, Mills, Pottawattamie and Shelby), each city with a population greater than 5,000 (currently the cities of Harlan and Glenwood) and other key transportation stakeholders from the area.
