# **NADTC Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Symposium**

Discussion Overview: August 25, 2023, Revive Center, Omaha, NE

### **Summary**

The Omaha - Council Bluffs Metropolitan Area Planning Agency (MAPA) and Metro Transit held the NADTC Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Symposium from 9am to 1pm on August 25, 2023 at the Revive Center in Omaha, Nebraska. There were a total 22 attendees, the diverse group consisting of six transportation providers, one Nebraska Unicameral elected official, three community organizations, three community members representing diverse populations, seven transit users, two attendees representing human service agencies, and provided their experiences and knowledge of the state of transportation in the Greater Omaha- Council Bluffs Metro Region.

The 22 participants were split into two groups and after initial introductions and presentation of the video the groups engaged in lively discussions. The following is a synopsis of the general description of the discussions that took place. In general the two groups provided general information regarding barriers, solutions and next steps that can be summarized within the following five categories:

- 1. Accessibility
- 2. Communication
- 3. Coordination
- 4. Education
- 5. Funding

Initial discussion began with the overarching acknowledgement and agreement that the greater Omaha community is greatly segregated based upon race and socioeconomic status. This led to a discussion with regards to the isolation felt by other members of senior, LGBTQ+ and disabled communities. A common thread for the marginalized groups was the limitations that transportation plays within the region to bring people together. Specifically mentioning the inability to consistently and effectively access employment and medical resources, and an overall lack of accommodations for communities with barriers related to language, visual or hearing impairments, or socioeconomic status. This was further refined to include land use decisions that have separated uses and developed areas that lack access to daily needs. Additional concerns with regards to communication and the lack of awareness regarding the different services that coordinate transit within the region. The need for additional access, communications, coordination, education of services, was underpinned by the lack of funding for transit in the region.

Solutions identified during the symposium included better advocacy of the transportation system among all entities providing services, and the enhancement of existing service related to reliability, service time and wayfinding. Collaboration with medical providers on dynamic scheduling for appointments (to account for inconsistent transit times) along with community navigators for persons needing assistance with transportation or healthcare were also deemed of high importance. Creating and building upon resources for languages not prominently spoken in the community, particularly for refugee populations, was deemed a high priority as these populations will continue to grow in the future.

Throughout the meeting, MAPA's Coordinated Transit Committee (CTC) was identified as a crucial gathering point for continued discussions and to provide continuity to find and implement solutions. The CTC has a diverse committee membership and is charged with facilitating project selection for the Federal Transportation Administration's 5310 Urbanized area fund for enhanced transportation for Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities program. Additionally, some solutions identified by both groups were more specific to Metro Transit regarding universal design, access, and existing fixed route transit services. Additionally, individual communities providing transportation services were identified as potential partners to implement solutions.

In order to continue this work, MAPA will convene the CTC membership in October and report out the summary of findings and work with the committee on follow-up actions that can be pursued by the CTC. Additionally, MAPA and Metro will revisit the initial discussions and reconvene a larger committee of local elected officials, state representatives, transportation providers, and human services providers for the region to work through some of the common barriers and solutions that impact the region. A list of the initial diversity, equity and inclusion Transportation Stakeholder List is included for reference at the end of this document.





# **Barriers and Issues in Our Community**

- Segregation and Isolation of marginalized communities
  - Segregation based upon race and socioeconomic status
  - Isolation among seniors and LGBTQ+ community
- Geographic areas not served by transit and paratransit
  - MOBY Service Limited to ¾ mile from fixed routes
    - In particular in Sarpy and Western Douglas Counties
    - Many government services are completely inaccessible without a personal vehicle
  - Jobs, medical resources, and other community resources not on bus routes, or on infrequent routes

# Language barriers

- Most communication is only in English
  - Marginal usage of Spanish on some documents
- Refugee populations have few resources for translation and assistance

### Barriers for persons with sensory or neurological disabilities

- Resources in braille or in sign language limited
- Discomfort for neurodiverse populations in loud settings (including buses)

#### Societal Issues

- The system is working as it was designed, meaning marginalized populations are not considered in the design of the built environment
- Stigma around public transportation, poverty and race
- Many cannot afford various transportation options

#### **Solutions**

#### Accessibility

- Create a platform of community navigators for persons from marginalized communities
- Explore more free or low fare options for paratransit
- Improve signage on buses and bus stops
- Improve sidewalk system region-wide
- Updated MOBY application and scheduling technology

#### Communication

- Improve tracking and timing of MOBY buses (similar to RideOMA or rideshare services)
- o Provide resources for persons without smartphones
- Utilize traditional and social media platforms for announcements
- MAPA and Metro should seek constant feedback from riders and providers, including surveys, outreach and public meetings
- Health and transportation resources in multiple languages, with provisions for persons with hearing or vision impairments.
- Partner with resettlement agencies on how to communicate with all new populations in the community, regardless of language spoken
- o Communicate Wins when they occur, and things that have worked in the past

#### Coordination

Begin a discussion on dynamic and buffered scheduling at medical providers

- Involve employers with DEI initiatives, including the Center for Disability Inclusion,
   Omaha and surrounding Chambers of Commerce, and large employers
- Continue progress on expanding and enhancing the Regional Transit Authority of Omaha to communities in Sarpy County, Pottawattamie County and Western Douglas County

#### • Education

- Provide educational materials and events on using Metro, MOBY and other paratransit resources
- Host training events for marginalized communities on how to use transit
- Educate drivers on humanization of riders, to feel more like people than passengers

#### Funding

- Explore funding options for increased geographic reach and higher frequencies on existing routes
- Explore new opportunities for free or reduced fares





# **Next Steps & Community Leaders**

- MAPA Coordinated Transit Committee
  - Utilize the MAPA Coordinated Transit Committee as a platform for continuing Diversity, Equity and Inclusion to develop framework of priorities and partners to solutions, related to:
    - Accessibility
    - Communication
    - Coordination
    - Education
    - Funding
  - Develop a Language Access Plan for transportation and health resources

#### Metro Transit

- Develop a consistent and frequent method of surveying and receiving feedback from marginalized communities (potentially using a third party surveyor)
- Explore the idea of community resource navigators
- o Explore new ideas for free or reduced fares
- Lead conversation on improving scheduling (online) and customer service for paratransit service

# • 5310 and Community Paratransit Providers

 Lead discussion on liability and insurance issues related to sharing and transporting clients using multiple transportation services

### Joint Efforts (MAPA CTC, Metro and 5310 Providers)

- Develop a Language Access Plan for transportation and health resources
- Develop a consistent and frequent method of surveying and receiving feedback from marginalized communities (potentially using a third party surveyor)
- Lead discussion on flexible and dynamic scheduling for health providers and shift workers to account for paratransit timing discrepancies
- Explore the idea of community resource navigators
