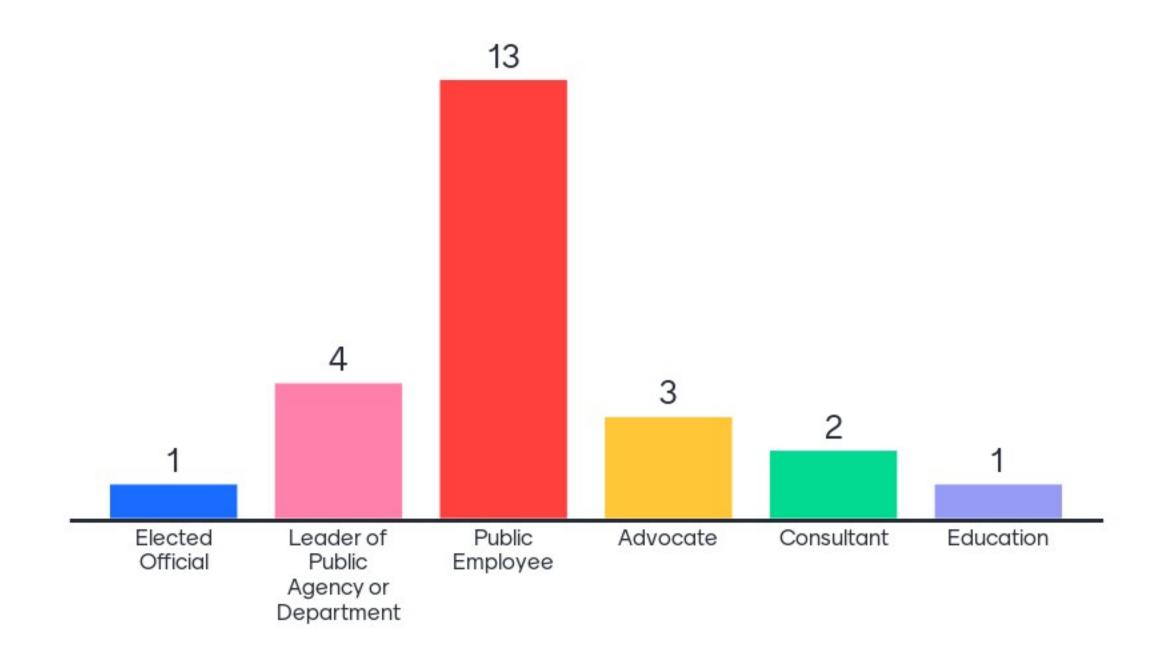

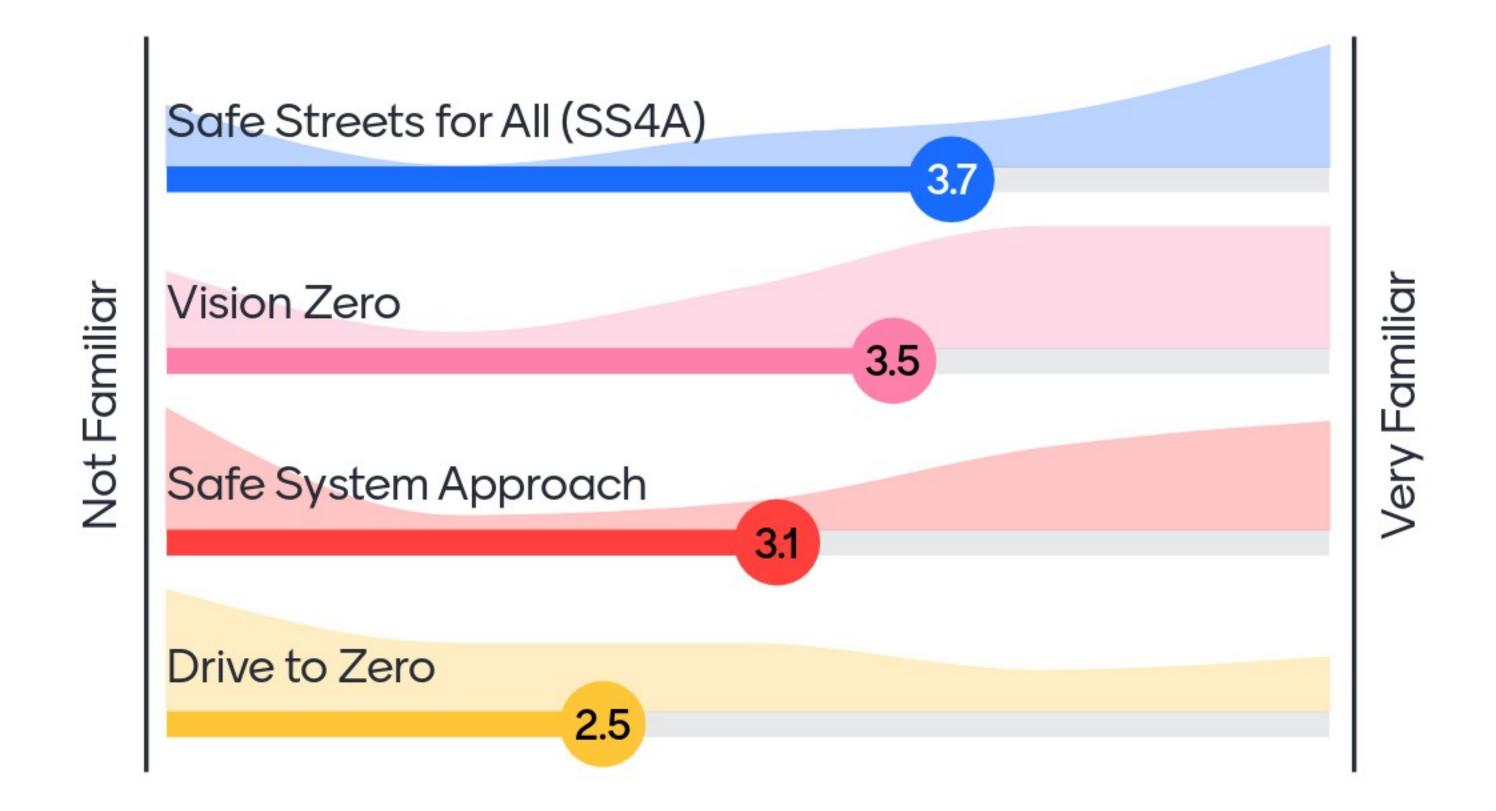




What is Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A)?

Background



Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) is a competitive grant program that will provide \$5 billion across 5 years to improve traffic safety by supporting local communities in the development of transportation safety action plans and the implementation of projects that reduce traffic fatalities and serious injuries on the local road network.

Planning and Demonstration Grants help to develop, complete, or supplement a Comprehensive Safety Action Plan (what we're doing!)

Implementation Grants help to build projects that address safety issues.

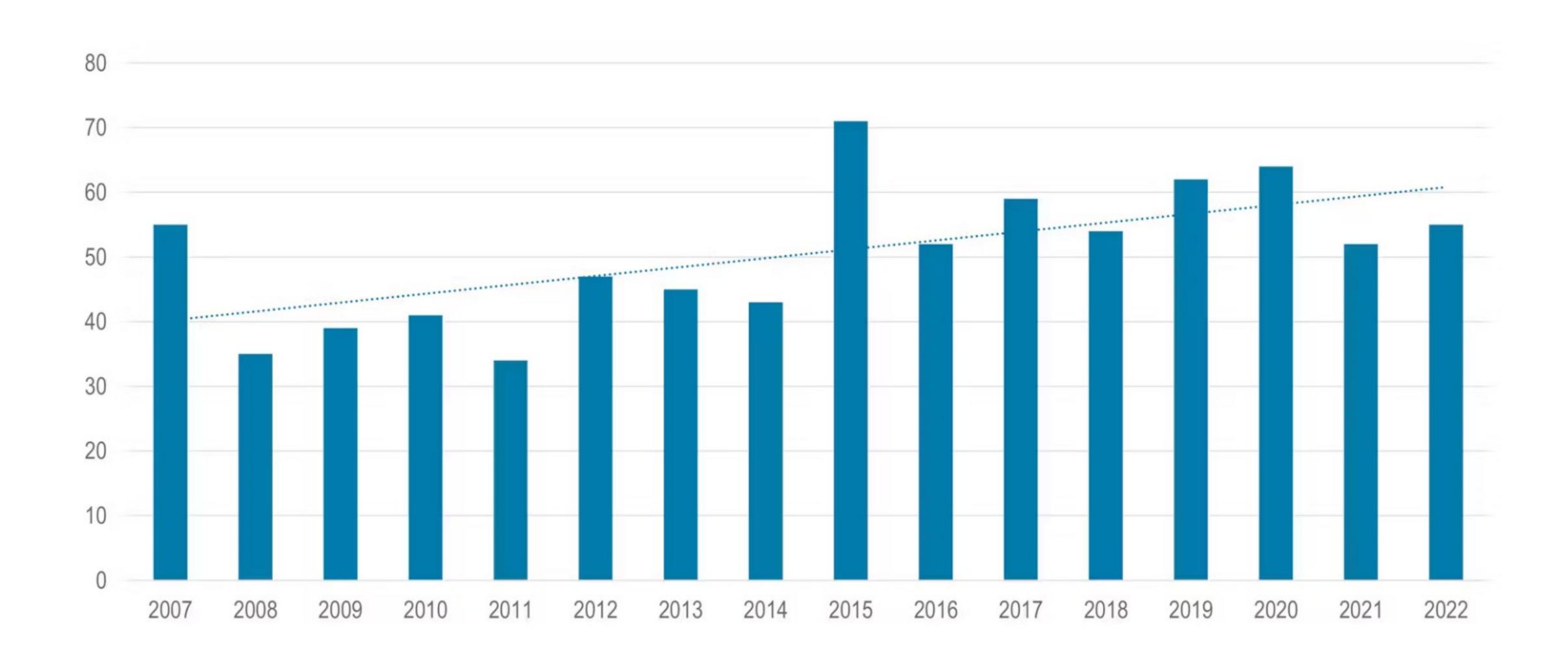
During the past 16 years (2007 – 2022) on our streets, there have been:

808 people killed ~4,000 people seriously injured

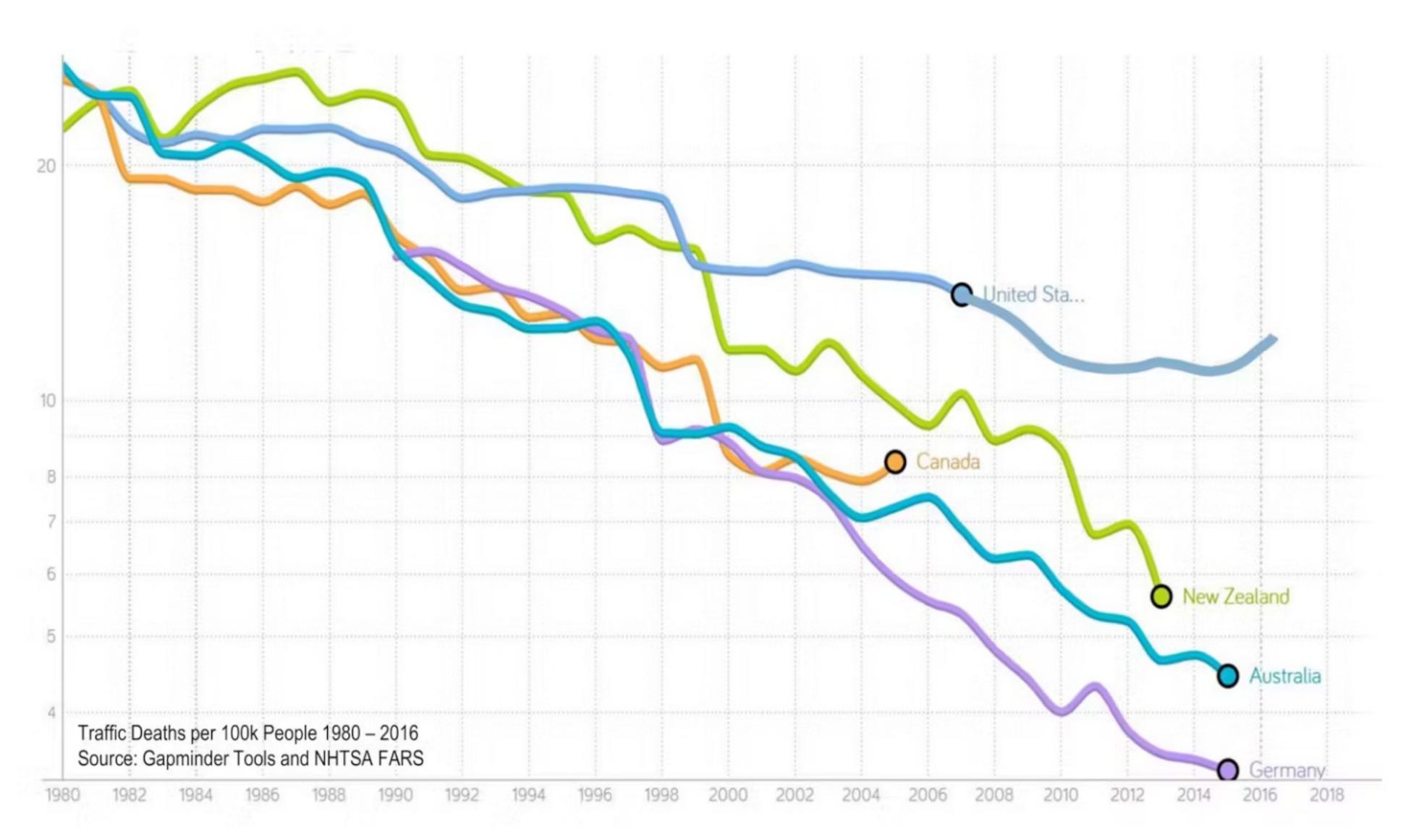
Vision Zero is a global movement that begin in Sweden in the 1970s to eliminate traffic deaths worldwide.

Vision Zero has dramatically reduced traffic deaths where implemented and fully achieved in early adopter cities.

	Traditional / Prevailing	Vision Zero
Issue	Preventing all crashes	Preventing fatalities and serious injuries
Premise	Deaths are inevitable	Deaths are preventable
Focus	Perfecting human behavior	Designing a road system that accounts for human error
Responsibility	Individual road users	Shared: road users and system designers

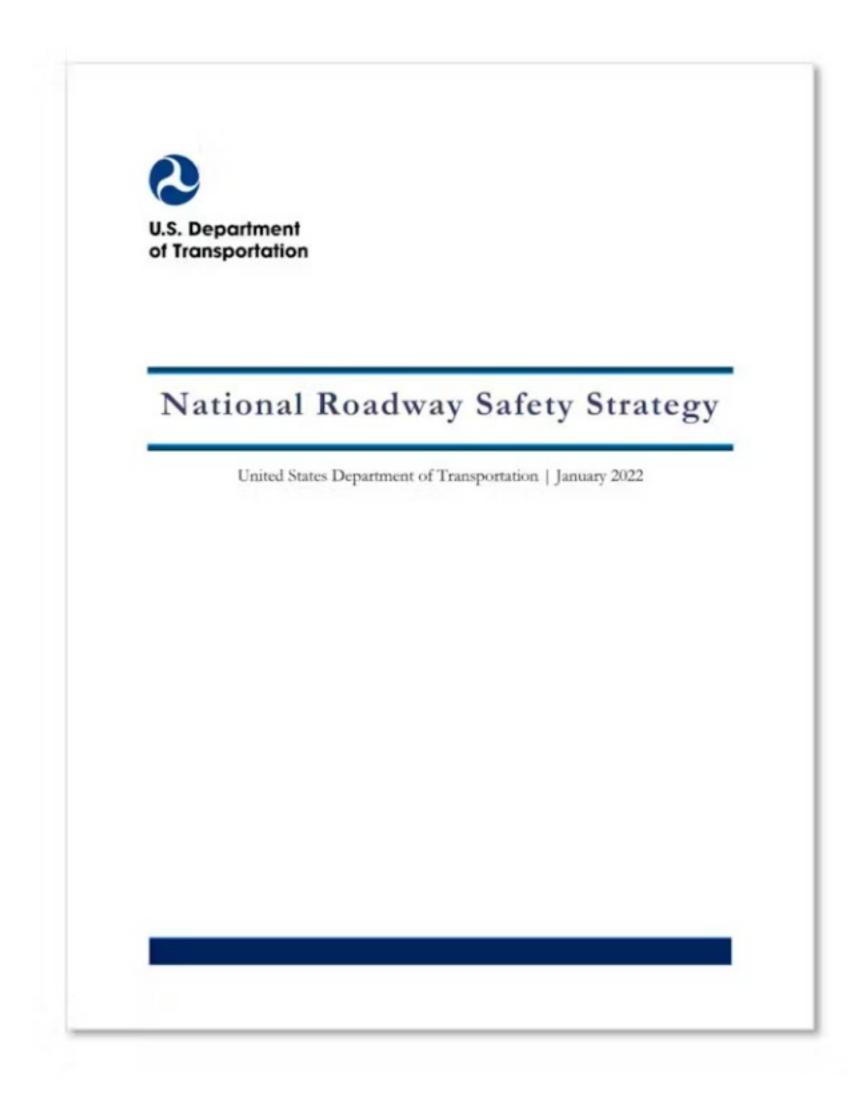

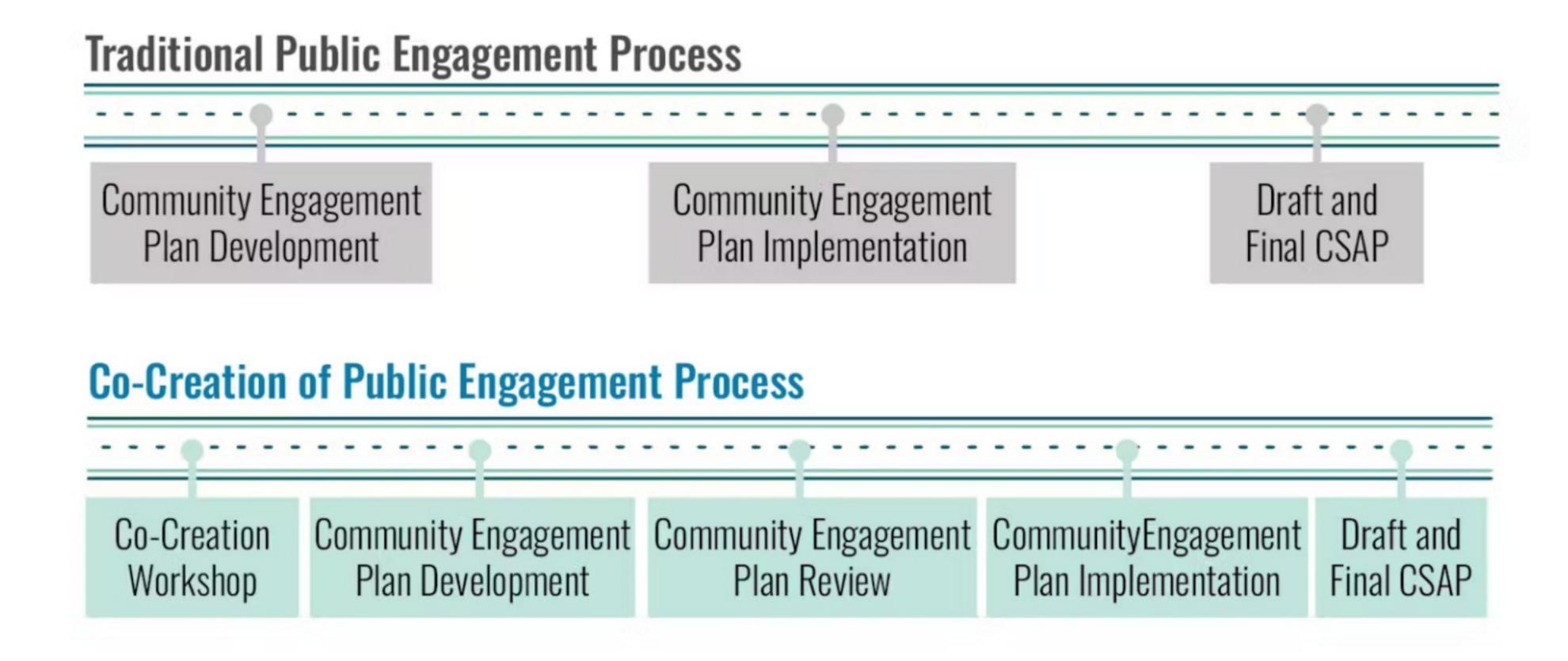
Co-Creation Event and Community Engagement Plan







Co-creating an engagement plan means collaborating with community representatives about engagement for the project *before* conducting broader community outreach about the project.





Equity Considerations

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FOR ALL

- Move at the speed of trust
- Acknowledge the impacts of history and systems
- Engage authentically and learn from the community
- Recognize the power of language and decision-making that come from the community
- Increase and promote accessibility
- Value iterative processes and co-creation techniques
- Support two-way communication and relationship building
- Continually identify partners and collaborate with them











- Outlines how MAPA and its consultant partners will conduct community engagement efforts on the project.
- Defines how the community engagement team will inform, consult, involve, collaborate and empower stakeholders and the public throughout the project.
- Details communication goals, key messages, audiences and specific outreach tools and engagement strategies.
- Includes expected timing for sharing project information with key audiences, including underserved communities as defined in USDOT's Equitable Transportation Community Explorer



Community Engagement Plan – Communication Goals



- Provide accessible, easy-to-understand education to impacted communities about project purpose, goals and schedule.
- Manage public expectations regarding limitations and opportunities for input.
- Gauge community and stakeholder perceptions of safety needs.
- Work directly with residents, businesses, community partners and stakeholders in underserved communities along corridors with significant safety needs to develop strategies and projects to be included in the Comprehensive Safety Action Plan (CSAP).
- Identify and engage with historically underserved and/or underrepresented communities throughout MAPA's region.
- Communicate proposed safety strategies, projects and next steps.
- Provide meaningful interactions and build a positive community of support for safety-focused solutions.

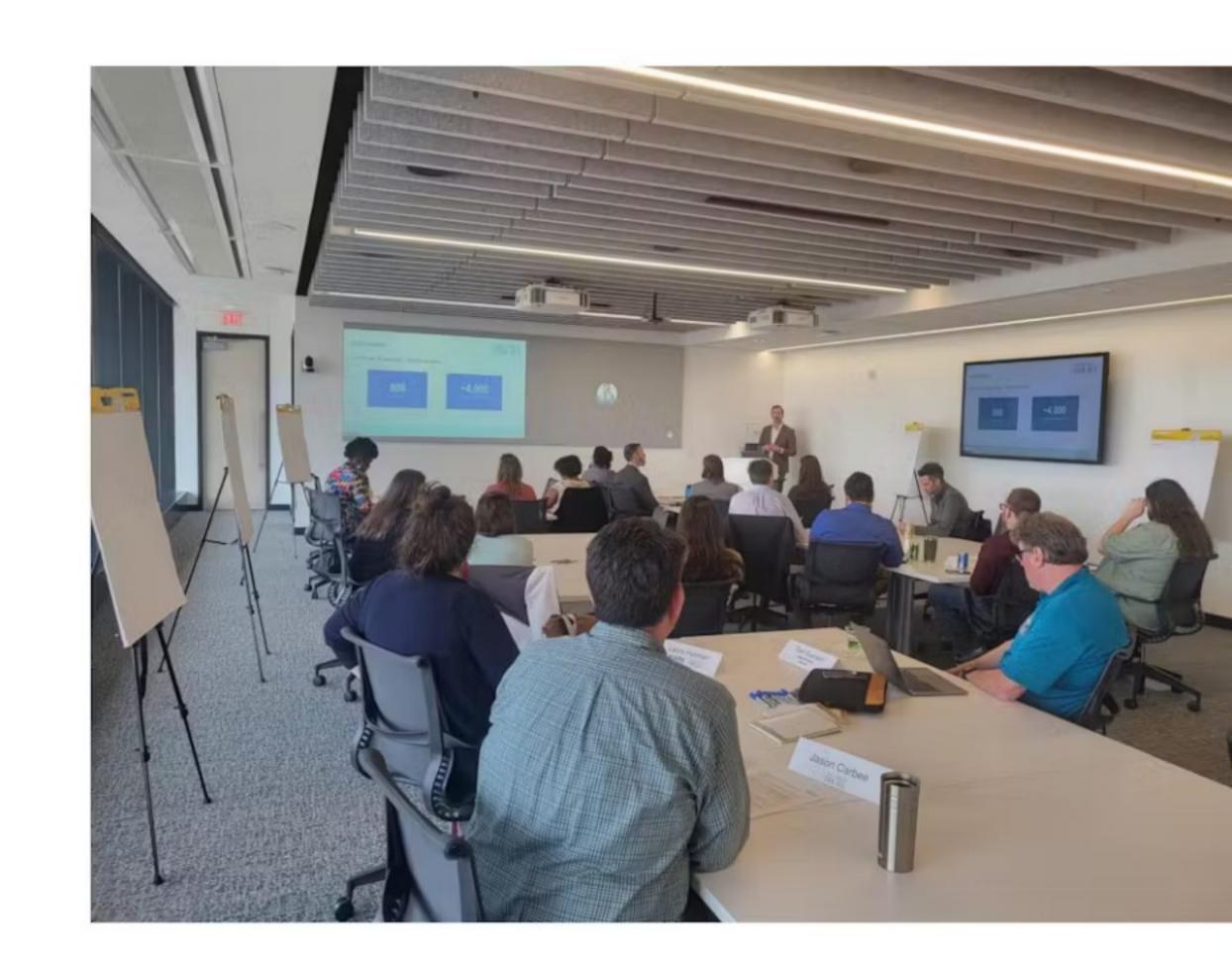




Co-Creation Workshop – Overview

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- Convened on Monday, April 22, 2024
- 12 individuals attended from various local governments, community organizations, transit agencies, and advocacy groups
- Activities included an educational presentation followed by breakout groups where participants offered input on the project's community engagement approach and methods

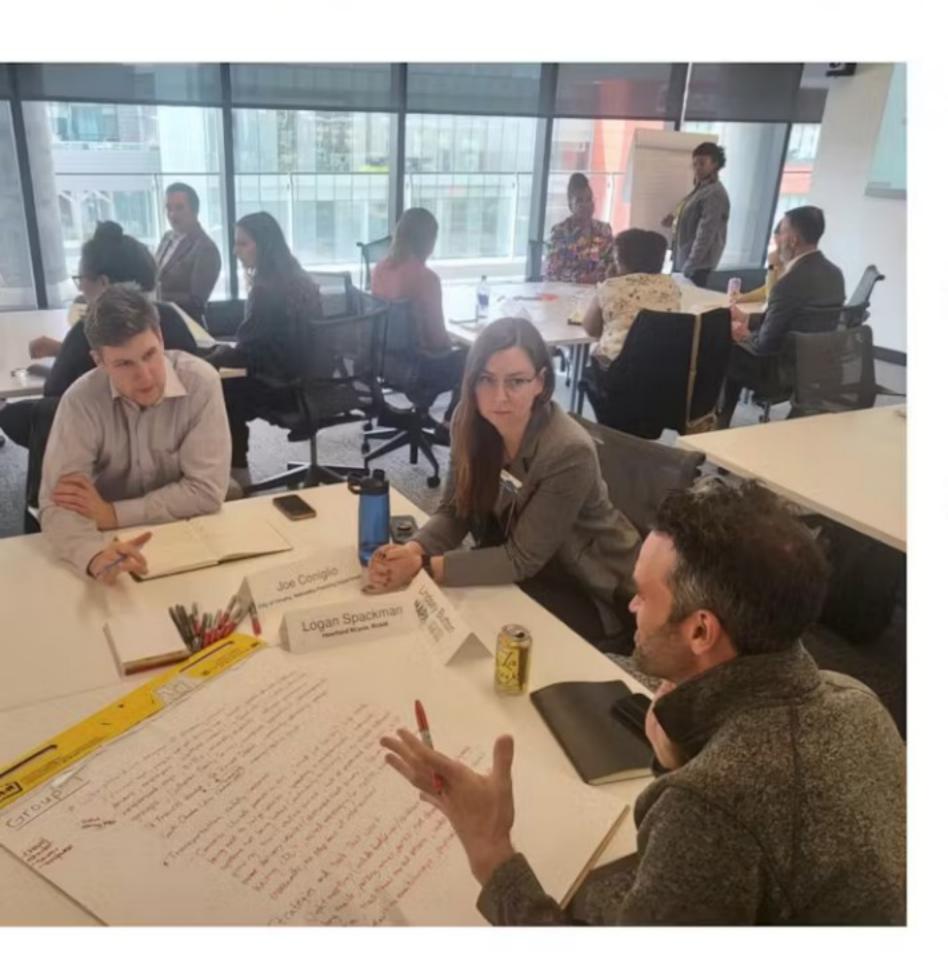






Co-Creation Workshop – Activity Results





- Most participants were somewhat familiar with the City of Omaha's Vision Zero initiative and SS4A.
- Attendees believe behavior change is the biggest challenge getting us to zero fatal and serious injuries by 2040.
- Participants want project engagement and communication to be widespread but also localized, educational, accessible, multi-disciplinary, community-focused and transparent.

Education of benefits and tradeoffs of safety improvements







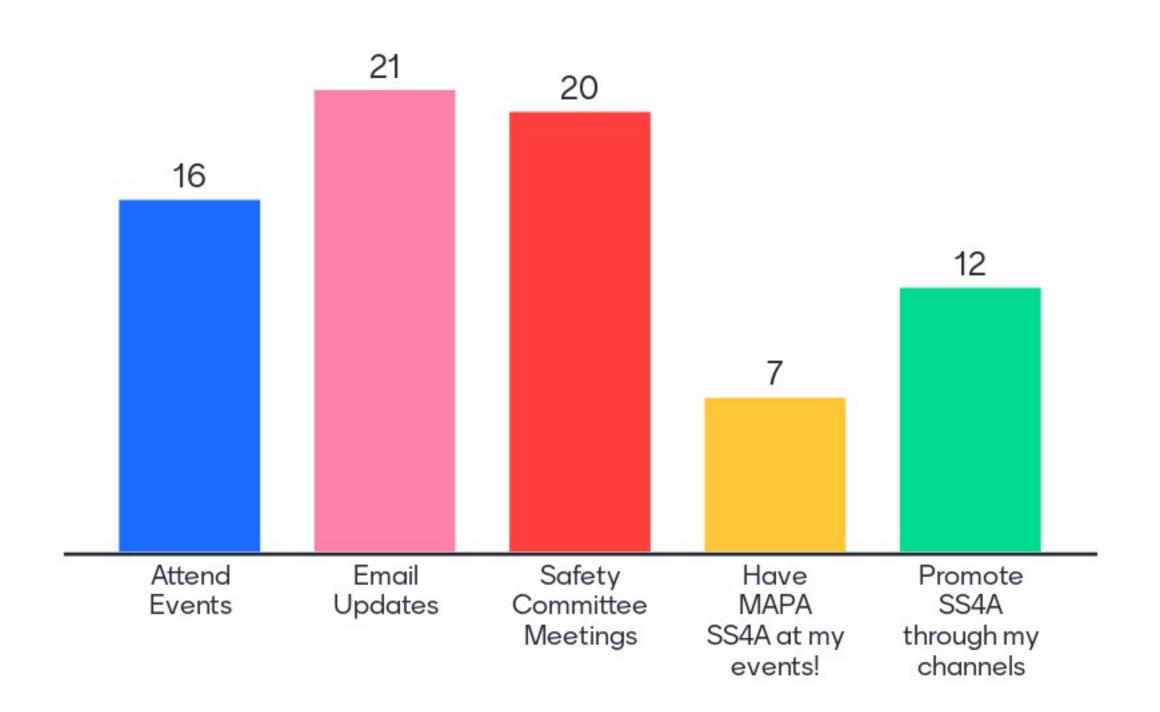

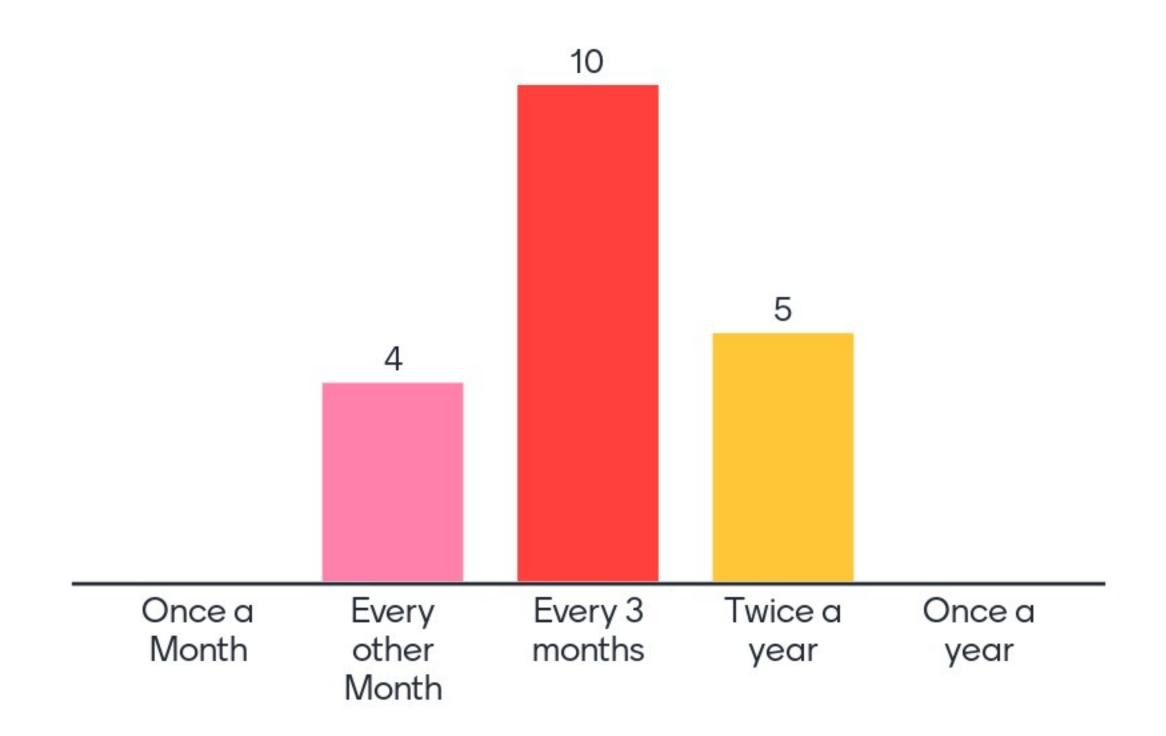
How involved would you like the Safety Committee to be in reviewing the CSAP?

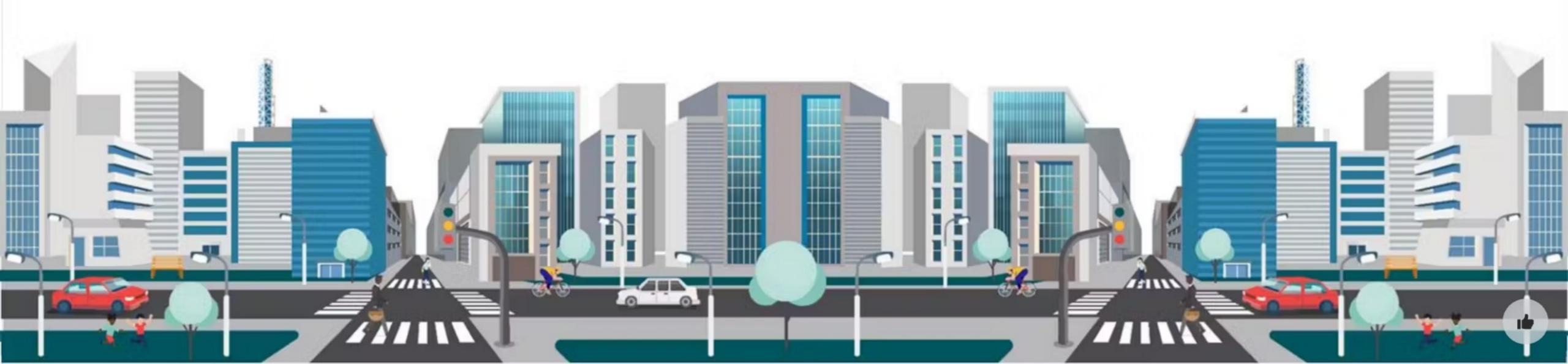
