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Homelessness Prevention Worker receives MAPA Citizenship Award

In 2011, an unexpected entrance into the field of human services led Tina Murray to her work preventing homelessness. Until then, Murray, now Director of Crisis Engagement at Together, had planned to work in probation services after finishing her degree. Now, she works diligently to change the narrative around homelessness, reject the stigma of poverty and help families or individuals obtain or remain in safe shelter and affordable housing.

"In Crisis Engagement, I have been able to implement the culture that not all situations are the same and that there need to be conversations around each participant's situation," said Murray. "I get to help empower my team to empower participants to stabilize and make real change in their lives."

One of Murray's recent accomplishments was initiating, building and implementing the Non-Congregate Shelter program in Omaha after recognizing the immediate need of housing the homeless during the pandemic.

The Non-Congregate Shelter program was an innovative project to utilize hotel facilities to provide people experiencing homelessness with their own space during the COVID-19 pandemic. The extra space and "non-congregate" environment helped slow the spread of COVID-19 while providing on-site case management and other services.

In her role, Murray also hired staff to take care of participant needs, worked late nights for those who needed shelter after hours and made sure there were fun activities like Movie Night and Game Night to make it feel like a real home and community.

"As we built the program, we saw many gaps in the homeless system and adjusted quickly to meet the needs of the participants in the program, making sure individuals had the identification they needed to obtain work and housing," said Murray. "We even had some individuals that stabilized enough to get clean and decide to go into treatment."

In her current position, Murray's top goal is to provide a place where people feel like they are seen as human beings and that their stories are being heard.

"I would like people to know that the stigma attached to the homeless is a false narrative. Many individuals are impacted by a traumatic event that has turned their lives upside down. Any of us could be in that position, especially with COVID-19," Murray said.

"I have staff that work for me now that have been homeless, have a criminal background, are recovering addicts and truly want to give back to our community. If everyone was given the support that they need, and if our community backed progress with the homeless population, the change we could make in people's lives would be endless."

For building and implementing the Non-Congregate Shelter and leveraging resources and seeking innovative solutions to homelessness through advocacy and partnerships, MAPA presented Tina Murray with its 2021 Annual Citizenship Award.



Call for Projects issued for regional funding programs

MAPA is calling for projects for a variety of regional funding programs from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA). Project applications for the FY2022 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) funding cycle should be submitted **no later than 4:30 pm on Friday, January 7, 2022**. The following counties are eligible for funding: Douglas and Sarpy Counties in Nebraska; Pottawattamie, Mills, Harrison and Shelby Counties in Iowa.

- Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program
- Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP)
- Heartland 2050 Mini-Grant Program
- FTA Section 5310 Program Enhanced
- Mobility of Seniors & Individuals with Disabilities
