- A. Welcome and Introductions Keith Station, Committee Chair
- B. Approval of Past Meeting Minutes Keith Station, Committee Chair ACTION
 - a. February 2 2023: Motion to approve by Gibbons, second by Jacobson; motion passed unanimously.
- A. FY2025 Draft Work Program Priorities and UPWP/CDWP: Mike Helgerson, MAPA
 - a. The annual member survey (generally open in late fall through early January) helps MAPA staff set work priorities for the upcoming fiscal year
 - b. MAPA Executive Director reviewed how those priorities have filtered into the budget and the work programs for FY 2025 (July 2024-June 2025)
 - i. Unified Planning Work Program
 - 1. MAPA's transportation team work
 - 2. \$8.4 million budget overall
 - ii. Community Development Work Program
 - 1. MAPA's community development team work
 - 2. \$1.1 million budget overall
 - c. Two comment periods open for
 - i. MAPA MPO Unified Planning Work Program: <u>tinyurl.com/upwpfy25</u>

B. Heartland 2050 Mini-Grant Selection Committee Recommendation: Michael Blank, MAPA - ACTION

- a. MAPA's transportation team presented the Heartland 2050 Mini-Grant Selection Committee's recommendations for funding
 - i. The Mini-Grant selection committees is made up of two members of RPAC, two members of MAPA's Transportation Technical Advisory Committee (TTAC) and one MAPA staff member
- b. The team presented the scoring rubric used to evaluate projects and answered questions from the committee
 - i. Is there consideration for sustainability of project/program in the scoring?
 - 1. This program mostly funds planning studies, so that is less of a consideration, which is why there is a greater emphasis on community support (local match, inclusion in other plans, etc.)
 - ii. Selection Committee members noted that the projects proposed showed community support
 - iii. The projects selected cost more than the amount of funding currently in the Mini-Grant program
 - 1. The Mini-Grant fund receives about \$330K every year, but MAPA doesn't offer a call for projects every year
 - 2. Additional funding will come from the remaining STBG funding pool
 - iv. Questions:
 - 1. Jurisdictions can apply for multiple projects
 - 2. Committee members do not need to abstain from voting if they are related to or involved in an application for funding
- c. **ACTION**: Motion to recommend that the MAPA Board approve the Heartland 2050 Mini-Grant Selection Committee's funding recommendation by Holm, second by Valentin; motion passed unanimously.

C. Prioritization Process Pilot Program Grant Opportunity: Rachel Goettsch, MAPA - ACTION

- a. MAPA plans to apply by May 1st
 - i. USDOT Discretionary funding
 - 1. Notice of funding opportunity: www.fhwa.dot.gov/planning/pppp/
 - 2. Limited to states and metropolitan planning organizations (like MAPA)
 - ii. Purpose is "To develop and implement a publicly accessible, transparent prioritization process for the ranking and selection of projects for inclusion in short-range and long-range transportation plans"
 - iii. Asking for the committee to sign a letter in support of the application and that the MAPA Board pass a resolution in support of the application
 - 1. Still working on the final application with a budget
 - a. Can ask for any amount up to \$2 million; likely will ask for over \$1 million
 - b. Would include high levels of community engagement
 - 2. Funding will go towards MAPA staff time, possibly a consultant and potential software to enhance our current processes end goal is a tool for applicants to submit projects and do their own evaluations





- b. **ACTION**: Motion for the committee to submit a letter in support of the application and to recommend that the MAPA Board submit a letter in support of the application by Gibbons, second by Stokes; motion passed unanimously.
- D. 5-2-1-0 Project Update: Ryan Ossell, MAPA
 - a. Council Bluffs was one of four communities selected for a pilot program
 - i. MAPA supported a community health needs asset mapping and project prioritization prior to receiving the funding
 - b. Currently in the first year of a three year funding program
 - i. Funding to the City of Council Bluffs through Iowa Department of Health & Human Services
 - ii. To help children and families make healthier food choices and live healthier lifestyles
 - iii. Created a steering committee to help make funding decisions
 - c. Currently funding four projects for a total of \$24,000
 - i. Water Fountain and Bottle Filling Station in Bayliss Park: \$10K award
 - ii. Wayfinding Signs for FIRST AVE Trail: \$6K award
 - iii. Increased Food Voucher Program: \$6K award
 - iv. Community Gardens for students: \$2K award
 - d. Two additional years of funding after this year, with smaller award amounts each year
 - e. Several additional public health opportunities coming through State of Iowa
 - i. ISU Extension Obesity Grant is currently in the works

E. Safe Streets & Roads for All (SS4A): James Boerner, MAPA

- a. MAPA and City of Omaha were awarded this funding
 - i. Goal is to create a Comprehensive Safety Action Plan (CSAP) to significantly reduce roadway fatalities and serious injuries on local roads
 - 1. Projects and programs listed in the plan will be prioritized for MAPA funding and may be eligible for future federal implementation funds
 - a. Looking to include project models and types that can apply broadly to multiple areas or jurisdictions
 - b. Will be looking at existing plans and projects to include
 - c. Will also be looking at how projects could be funded through other funding sources
 - 2. Coordinating with other efforts, including:
 - a. City of Omaha Vision Zero Action Plan
 - b. MAPA is required by federal legislation to follow the Safe Systems Approach, which is a more comprehensive and proactive approach to safety
 - c. Complete Streets focuses on design for multiple transportation modes like biking and walking
 - ii. Study area covers Douglas and Sarpy Counties as well as the cities of Council Bluffs, Carter Lake, Crescent and McClelland in Iowa (other areas are covered by other grants)

 - i. Covers seven cities in the Iowa RPA 13 and RPA 18 areas
 - ii. More information coming soon

F. Western Sarpy Transportation Enhancement Plan (WE-STEP): James Boerner, MAPA

- b. Planning study funded by a Heartland 2050 Mini-Grant
 - i. Fits the Heartland 2050 goal of matching land use decisions with transportation network planning
- c. Develop a structure to determine the future road network in western Sarpy County ahead of anticipated growth and development
 - i. Will help jurisdictions have a unified approach and plan for development to aid in decision-making
 - ii. Goal is consistency in design between jurisdictions
 - iii. Working closely with the Sarpy Wastewater Agency
 - iv. This plan builds on the Sarpy I-80 PEL which worked to determine where a future interchange on I-80 should be located
