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Pottawattamie County Housing Trust Fund announces awards

Home repairs and renovations which allow seniors to age in place, a program which works to prevent people from being evicted from their homes and rental assistance for struggling low-to-moderate income residents. These are some of the 10 projects that will receive funding from the Pottawattamie County Housing Trust Fund's 2023 application cycle.

The trust fund awarded a total of \$359,015 in grants.

The following organizations will receive funding:

- **Pottawattamie Co. General Assistance \$30,227** for continued funding to provide deposit and first month's rental assistance
- Connections Area Agency on Aging \$45,000 for housing repairs and renovations on units to remove accessibility barriers for seniors
- Interfaith Response \$50,000 rental assistance for households in need
- Habitat for Humanity \$33,000 for down payment assistance for three Habitat homebuyers
- Habitat for Humanity \$50,000 for home repairs to 15 units in the homeowner repair program
- Family Housing Advisory Services \$25,000 for interest rate buydown project
- Heartland Family Services \$46,191 for replacing countertops in 23 Heartland Homes units
- lowa Legal Aid \$28,597 for an eviction diversion program
- Micah House \$11,000 for installation of an ADA accessible door at the Micah House shelter
- New Visions Homeless Services \$40,000 for a homelessness prevention program targeting 75 households

Organizations must expend all funding on projects which benefit people below 80% of the federal family median income limit.

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Council of Officials focuses on OPPD's growth

In the next few years Omaha Public Power District will focus on doubling the amount of electricity it supplies to its 13-county service area to meet the demands of growth and development and regulatory requirements.



"We're anticipating at least 100 megawatts per year in new growth," said Brook Aken, Director of Economic Development and External Relations for OPPD.

Aken made the remarks as the keynote speaker

at MAPA's Council of Officials meeting in Ft. Calhoun on June 14.

Aken said OPPD has seen a great deal of growth in biotech, manufacturing, data centers, food processing and agriculture processing.

MAPA's next Council of Officials meeting will be its annual dinner meeting on Oct. 3, 2023, at the Bellevue Berry Farm.



MAPA cohosts Valley Town Hall

The City of Valley and MAPA hosted a Town Hall on June 21 to get feedback from residents about their community needs, wishes and concerns.

The Town Hall meeting follows a Community Needs Assessment survey MAPA conducted for the City and Valley's Community Collaboration Group to guide local planning efforts. Two-hundred ninety households responsed, representing more than 900 people – nearly 1/3 of Valley residents. The survey allowed MAPA to identify issues for improvement in Valley.

Survey results boasted generally positive remarks of Valley. Hiking and biking trails and sports amenities were noted as areas for improvement. At the Town Hall, people had the opportunity to voice their opinions in small group discussions.
