- C. Climate Pollution Reduction Grant: Carlos Morales, MAPA
  - a. U.S. EPA Climate Pollution Reduction Planning Grants
    - i. https://www.epa.gov/inflation-reduction-act/climate-pollution-reduction-grants
    - ii. Awarded to states and local entities to design climate action plans that incorporate a variety of measures to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions from across their economies in six key sectors (electricity generation, industry, transportation, buildings, agriculture/natural and working lands, and waste management)
    - iii. Both the City of Omaha and the State of Nebraska received planning grant awards in 2023 and must submit the following deliverables to EPA:
      - 1. Priority Climate Action Plan (PCAP) due March 1, 2024
        - a. Projects or strategies must be listed in the PCAP to be eligible for implementation funding (see more info below)
      - 2. **Comprehensive Climate Action Plan (CCAP)** due two years after planning grant award (approximately mid-2025)
      - 3. **Status Report** due at the close of the grant period (approximately mid-2027)

- c. Committee reviewed potential strategies for greenhouse gas reduction that are currently being considered by the State of Nebraska and City of Omaha
- d. Goal is to support local Implementation Grant applications

  - ii. Implementation Grants FAQ webinar on February 15 at 3 pm (register)
  - iii. First round of funding applications are due April 1 2024
    - 1. Those grants will only fund projects identified in the PCAP
    - 2. Grant amounts range from \$2 to \$500 million
    - 3. Grants seem to be highly competitive; a good strategy is to build coalitions to accomplish projects (multiple jurisdictions, or public-private partnerships, etc.)
    - 4. Rather than taking best practices from other areas, we want to focus on current and upcoming local projects, and strategies that align with
    - 5. If you're thinking about applying, a SAM registration number is necessary and takes about a month to get (otherwise, you can partner with someone who already has a SAM number)
  - iv. Future rounds of implementation funding are not guaranteed
- e. MAPA staff would love to meet with any jurisdictions and partner organizations to discuss projects and strategies, as well as potential future implementation grant applications
- f. Committee Discussion
  - i. If we're talking about a region, we should think about strategies that impact the larger region, with the benefit spread throughout the region and not just in the City of Omaha
  - ii. We absolutely need a consistent message to elected officials





- iii. We should be keeping the Justice 40 initiative in mind
- iv. City of Omaha did have Office of Sustainable Development in the past
  - 1. included LED streetlight updates
- v. Electrification
  - 1. OPPD has a Decarbonization Plan toward a net zero by 2050 goal
    - a. Electricity will grow in proportion of total power production but will lower GHG emissions overall
    - b. Renewables are cheapest source of power production
  - 2. Upcoming significant growth in the region
    - a. Best case is to think about electrification and other GHG reduction measures ahead of development
    - b. Communities will need to lead in policy changes
- vi. Billions in federal tax credits are available for energy upgrades in new development; we need to help developers be aware of and access this funding
- D. Traffic Reports: Owen Stuckey, MAPA
  - a. Every two years MAPA aggregates traffic count data from a number of sources and compiles it into a regional dataset

  - b. MAPA only aggregates traffic counts from other jurisdictions or partners, we don't do any traffic counts ourselves
  - c. Geography is the local Transportation Management Area (TMA)
    - i. Douglas and Sarpy Counties in Nebraska
    - ii. The urbanized portion of Pottawattamie County in Iowa (Council Bluffs)
- E. MAPA Annual Member Survey: Mike Helgerson, MAPA
  - a. MAPA sends a survey out every year to help us understand the needs of the communities we serve
    - i. 30 responses this year (much more than previous years)
  - b. Helps MAPA staff develop programming, strategies and priorities for the upcoming fiscal year, and informs our budget and work plan
  - c. Reviewed survey results with the committee:
    - i. About 80% of respondents said that Housing and Development and Transportation are important local priorities for the upcoming year
    - ii. Top Housing and Development priorities include Housing Choices and Housing Affordability





- iii. Top Transportation priorities include Walking/Biking Trails and Sidewalk Connectivity
- d. Committee members thought it would be interesting to see how responses might differ by geography or rural/urban/suburban
