progress in completing the portions of Great American Rail-Trail which cross their states. The Great American Rail-Trail will be the first cross-country multi-use trail in the United States, with plans to span more than 3,700 miles from Washington, D.C. to Washington State.

Kevin Belle, project manager of the Great American Rail-Trail, spoke about efforts to complete the trail at MAPA's Council of Officials Annual Meeting on October 9th in Council Bluffs.



Belle said in Iowa and Nebraska. the trail is 53% and 52% completed about trails has changed in the past several years.

Belle pointed to a study by Headwaters **Fconomics** which demonstrates the economic impact a trail like the Great American Rail-Trail can have on communities. That study says that once the portions of the Great American Rail-Trail in Iowa and Nebraska are completed they will bring approximately \$14.5 million in new annual visitor spending to each state.

Belle lauded the City of Council Bluffs transforming former Chicago and North western Railroad spur into the FIRST AVE trail. He said the Rails-to-Trails Conservancy, at the urging of the City of Council Bluffs, changed the Great American Rail-Trail route to go through the city instead of around it because of the FIRST AVE trail.

There are 81 gaps remaining in the trail and Belle said he is encouraged by progress to close the last gap in the Mo-Pac trail between Lincoln and Omaha. "I can't emphasize enough

# Input sought for Long Range Transportation Plan surveys

MAPA is updating its 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan and the Regional Planning Affiliation (RPA)-18 Long Range Transportation Plan and is looking for public input through two surveys.

The 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan is a comprehensive plan projecting the transportation needs for the Omaha-Council Bluffs metro area (Douglas, Sarpy and western Pottawattamie Counties) for the next 25 years, while the RPA-18 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan projects transportation needs in Harrison, Shelby and Mills Counties and the rural portion of Pottwattamie County.

Projects must be listed in long range transportation plans to be eligible for federal funding. The plans are updated every five years. Public input from the surveys will help inform the 2025 updates for both Long Range Transportation Plans.

### Safe Streets for All project seeks leadership commitment

In early September, MAPA began hosting meetings with community leaders to secure their commitment to the Safe Streets for All project, which aims to reduce traffic fatalities and serious injuries to zero by 2040.



The project team met with many of the member jurisdiction public works, planning, and law enforcement staff to better understand the communities' existing safety policies and procedures and areas they feel could benefit from the regional Safe Streets for All planning.

This input will be included within the Comprehensive Safety Action Plan, planned for approval in the spring of 2025. Sixteen communities have contributed to date.

Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) is a competitive grant program through the U.S. Department of Transportation, providing \$5 billion dollars over five years to improve traffic safety by supporting local communities in the development of safety action plans and the implementation of projects which reduce traffic fatalities and serious injuries on the local road network. The plan includes Douglas and Sarpy Counties in Nebraska, plus the cities of Council Bluffs, Carter Lake, Crescent and McClelland in Iowa.

The new Platte River Bridge Trail along US Highway 34/75 connecting Sarpy and Cass Counties is a key example of regional collaboration.


MAPA convened partners and orchestrated a massive infrastructure agreement to swap state for federal funding to build the bridge and create pedestrian and bicycle access.

The new trail, which opened Aug. 3, provides greater safety to bridge users and increased recreational opportunities for trail users by providing a connection across the Platte River between Sarpy County and Cass County and a key connection in the regional trail network.
