# **Action Items**

#### A. Approval of the Minutes from the October 18, 2024 Meeting

Austin Rowser motioned to approve the minutes. Motion was seconded by Maurice Hinchey. Motion passed unanimously.

#### B. Approval of the Minutes from the October 4, 2024 Meeting

#### C. FY2025 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Amendment 3

Court Barber presented the amendment, which included changes to projects sponsored by the City of Council Bluffs, the City of Omaha, and NDOT.

#### Austin Rowser motioned to:

Recommend MAPA's Board of Directors approve the FY2025 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Amendment 3.
 Motion was seconded by Bryan Guy. Motion passed unanimously.

#### D. FY2025 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) Amendment 1

Carlos Morales presented the updated plan. On August 13, 2024 FHWA issued a clarified waiver of the Non-Federal Match for State Planning and Research and Metropolitan Planning Funds in Support of Complete Streets Planning Activities, including a consolidation of codes from 12 to 4, original guidance of 2%, and an updated FTA number.

#### **Eric Williams motioned to:**

Recommend MAPA's Board of Directors approve the FY2025 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) Amendment 1.
 Motion was seconded by Maurice Hinchey. Motion passed unanimously.

#### E. Open a Public Comment Period for the Civil Rights Plan — Mixed TTAC/RPAC approval

Lindsey Button presented the updated plan, including a review of the Civil Rights Plan requirement as it applies to MAPA. Updates are federally required every three years and include specific accommodation policies for Title VI, Limited English Proficiency (LEP), and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Updates consisted of updated demographic snapshots, alignment with updated guidance from NDOT and Iowa DOT, an updated complaint form, an exploration of translations options for the MAPA website (currently available only in English), and the development of a more formalized staff training program.

To inform the policy updates, MAPA has published the Committee Demographic Survey which will fulfill the committee diversity reporting requirement for MAPA's Civil Right Policy, and inform MAPA's work to support Civil Rights.

The update has been reviewed by the RPA-18 committee and will be reviewed by the MAPA Board, H2050 EEC, and CTC over the next two weeks.



Keith Station requested that the Plan be sent out to RPAC membership. Lindsey Button confirmed this would come in a followup email of the

# **Discussion Items**

#### F. Safe Streets for All - Priorities and Project Selection Criteria

Tim Adam with WSP provided an overview of the criteria utilized in selecting projects for the draft Comprehensive Safety Action Plan (CSAP) with a breakdown of methodology, the Countermeasure Toolbox, and priority projects.

#### Methodology:

- Projects are based on High Priority Network (HPN) Tool
  - The HPN is made up of a retrospective High Injury Network (HIN), a predictive High Risk Network (HRN), and a responsive Community Survey Network
- Interventions and Crash Reduction Factors identified from a Proven Countermeasure List
- Crashes assigned to projects, with a benefit-cost ratio calculated

Countermeasure Toolbox specific to the following case types:

- Segment
- Intersection
- Pedestrians & Bicycles
- Rural/Highway

#### **Priority Projects:**

- Criteria
  - o Projects must be included in the HPN, with minor exceptions
    - Some HPN intersections and segments were excluded under specific limiting circumstances
- Results
  - 752 intersections (2.7% of network)
  - o 552 miles of road (7.8% of network)
  - o 1705 KSIs accounted for
  - o 2205 KSIs Total (77.3%)
  - Representative ratio of between 10:1 and 28:1
  - Potential reduction of at least 63 KSIs per year
- Benefit-Cost Analysis (NDOT, Iowa DOT, and USDOT)
- Next Steps
  - Draft Prioritized Implementation Plan (early Dec 2024)
  - o Draft Recommendation (late Dec 2024)
  - First Draft of Safety Action Plan (mid-Jan 2025)
  - MOUs for Review (Feb 2025)
  - o Final Safety Action Plan (March 2025)

Keith Station asked what can be done to help drive activity for the engagement efforts.

# G. Nebraska Infrastructure Hub

Jenna Habeggar with NDOT presented the Hub and an overview of the Hub's website. Key components include the Grant Pairing Portal designed by NDOT and its consultants (HDR and High Street) who are also available to support



grant development and data support, in addition to \$2 million available to help write grants which are 100% state funded, with no local match required.

Two fulltime employees are dedicated to supporting the Hub. The state was divided by NACO districts between Jenna Habeggar and Dina Harris, with Jenna being the designated representative for the MAPA region.

#### H. Equitable Growth Profile Introduction

Owen Stuckey presented the Equitable Growth Profile. The First version of the profile was developed in 2014, with a following version being published in 2018. The current version is set to be released in 2025, with the profile (narrative, chart, summary, StoryMap resource), data (sources from publicly available sources). The profile covers demographics, economic vitality, readiness, connected, economic benefits of equity. Overall trends include an increase in the percentage of people of color of the entire population in the region. Recommendations include increasing connections to good jobs, raising the floor for low wage work, increasing diversity in leadership, improving job training. This profile tool can be used to assess the current commitment to equity in order to support a more equitable future

Keith Station asked for more context regarding the racial equity income gap. Owen clarified that this was sourced from the census, noting that although POC tend to own more businesses they net less than their white counterpart. Keith followed up with a question about what factors into the racial/ethnic composition. Owen stated that it can be somewhat attributed to the decline of birth rates in certain racial segments of the population, but is otherwise difficult to pinpoint.

Someone asked if the racial income gap was specific to our region or nationwide, and how those two compared. Owen stated that the MAPA region is not unique and that although this fluctuates across geographies, it is a common trend nationwide.

#### I. Long Range Transportation Plan & Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy Update

Court Barber provided an update on the status of these projects and the timeline for completion. RPA-18 is also following a similar update timeline. The public survey is currently open.
