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A NOTE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

MAPA made significant progress towards its long-term goals over the past year and noted some major successes in our work with our members. Notably, the adoption of our regional Comprehensive Safety Action Plan helps ensure we will be making progress towards MAPA's goal of zero traffic deaths and serious injuries by 2040. This bold goal adopted by the Board of Directors puts our region on a path to preserve our quality of life enjoyed in our region through proactive safety investments in our transportation system.

Within the ranks of MAPA's members, we see multi-jurisdictional partnerships delivering collaborative approaches to complicated **local issues.** The Western Sarpy County Transportation Enhancement Program (WE-STEP) is a great example of this kind of partnership, delivering a program of projects, priorities and policies to support and coordinate the long-term growth for communities. From thoughtful mini-grant applications to strategic planning and goalsetting workshops in our small communitiesour team is fortunate to get to work alongside local leaders stepping up to think long-term about the opportunities to invest in their communities' growth, prosperity and safety.

In our interactions with MAPA members, we also see tremendous resilience and service to communities by elected and appointed officials. Local governments have faced significant challenges driven by longrun inflation and supply chain disruptions that impact projects large and small. Additionally, over the past two years, each of MAPA's six member counties has faced multiple presidential disaster declarations

from increasingly frequent severe weather events. MAPA staff have worked closely with communities on these recovery efforts and the MAPA Board has allocated new resources to help MAPA plan and support our members to ensure that gaps in coordination are addressed in communities across the region.

We've also entered a period where the long-term partnership between the federal government and local governments is being reimagined. MAPA's work is often centered on federal funding and helping leverage the investment of local governments within our region. Our Strategic Plan calls us to serve as a trusted regional convener to problemsolve with our members and partners to adapt to changing budgets and reauthorization priorities at the federal level. With investments in planning, coordination and staffing resources, we continue to reorganize ourselves to adapt to this changing landscape.

I'm honored to serve this agency and the Omaha-Council Bluffs region as a whole. Thank you to everyone who served on MAPA's committees, attended a meeting, or grabbed a cup of coffee with us to talk during the past year. Our team is looking forward to the next opportunity to work alongside you on your next project.



WHAT'S NEXT?

In the coming year, MAPA is focusing on:

Surface Transportation Reauthorization As Congress works on a bill to reauthorize federal transportation funding, we are communicating with members of Iowa and Nebraska's congressional delegations to emphasize the need to build on the higher funding levels and successful programs in the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act.

Navigating the Changing Funding Landscape Our members have many questions about the availability of funding programs for current and future projects. We will continue to seek guidance from our state and federal partners on proper procedures in securing and allocating funds in this new environment.

Disaster Recovery Legislation With multiple recent disaster declarations across our region, we are closely monitoring potential changes to federal disaster recovery funding. MAPA is also working to help local communities find additional resources and finance recovery efforts until federal disaster funds become available.


MAPA staff are finalizing major regional planning documents that work together to align and prioritize investments across the region and support local decision-making.

A FOCUS ON SAFETY IS A MAIOR FOICHS IN

SAFETY IS A MAJOR FOCUS IN MAPA'S TRANSPORTATION WORK

In the past year, MAPA completed a regional Comprehensive Safety
Action Plan (CSAP), which identifies and prioritizes projects aimed at improving safety for all roadway users. This project was funded through the US Department of Transportation (USDOT) Safe Streets for All competitive grant program.

Aligning with the City of Omaha's Vision Zero Action Plan, the goal of the Comprehensive Safety Action Plan is to reduce all traffic fatalities and serious injury crashes to zero by 2040 through policy changes and traffic safety projects. Strategies and projects included in the plan will be eligible for future implementation funding.

The plan, developed in collaboration with MAPA's Transportation Technical Advisory Committee (TTAC) and Safety Committee, follows the USDOT's proactive Safe Systems Approach, which focuses on designing transportation systems to be forgiving of human error and minimize the impact of crashes.

This plan includes Douglas and Sarpy Counties in Nebraska as well as the cities of Council Bluffs, Carter Lake, Crescent and McClelland in Iowa.

The Western Sarpy Transportation Enhancement Plan (WE-STEP) is one example of how MAPA works to align communities and build coalitions across jurisdictional lines.

WE-STEP is a strategic transportation plan for western Sarpy County, developed in collaboration with the City of Gretna, City of Papillion, City of Springfield, Sarpy County, and MAPA.

This innovative, proactive and award-winning approach provides a framework for development of

the transportation network in these rapidly-changing communities, with shared design standards that allow for future growth but can be flexible and responsive as that growth occurs.

In March, the American Planning Association (APA) Nebraska Chapter awarded WE-STEP its Planning Excellence Award at their annual conference (see page 23).

The WE-STEP project was funded by a \$100,000 Heartland 2050 Mini-Grant made to the City of Gretna.



Blair's South Bypass opened to traffic in August 2024. MAPA helped secure a \$7.56 million BUILD grant to fund construction of this project, which reduces heavy truck traffic and increases pedestrian and bicycle safety in Blair's busy downtown business district.





The U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) awarded MAPA \$2 million to implement a prioritization process project known as Transformative Regional Investment Prioritization System (TRIPS).

The program provides funding for MAPA and the Nebraska Department of Transportation to develop and implement a publicly accessible, transparent prioritization process for the ranking and selection of projects for inclusion in short and long range transportation plans throughout the state.

This pilot program will bring a revolutionary decisionmaking model to Nebraska's largest transportation planning organizations, and will enhance selection efficiency and ensure that projects align with community needs and values. Follow this project at mapacog.org/projects/trips

The USDOT awarded a total of \$10 million through the program for this fiscal year, with MAPA receiving the maximum award amount of \$2 million.

Through the Thriving Communities Initiative, MAPA, Spark CDI, the City of Omaha, Metro Transit and community members examined the impacts of Highway 75 on the North Omaha community and ways to reconnect the historically Black community that was displaced and separated by this infrastructure project.

Key goals included:

- Restoring trust of transportation-based planning decisions
- Encouraging community engagement & enacting change through urban planning and design
- · Addressing past harms by discussing and evaluating impacts of
- North Freeway corridor on surrounding neighborhood
- Securing future investment by leveraging public and private funding for projects that enhance North Freeway corridor

During project meetings, community members identified impacts from the construction of Highway 75 including displacement of residents, loss of local businesses, reduced property values, increased traffic, and environmental issues. Residents also identified projects to help enhance the corridor and revitalize the area surrounding it.

To continue this work, MAPA applied for and was awarded a \$1.5 million Reconnecting Communities grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation to advance conceptual and preliminary design of improvements along the North Freeway. That project is expected to start in late 2025 or early 2026.

MAKING STRATEGIC INVESTMENTS

In its role as an Economic Development District, every five years MAPA develops a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) to serve as an economic roadmap for creating jobs, fostering a more stable and diversified economy, and improving living conditions within the region.

Feedback from stakeholder engagement and outreach helped shape the 2025 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy, which will be released for public comment in November, with formal MAPA Board of Directors approval expected in December before the plan is submitted to the U.S. EDA.

MAPA is partnering with the Latino Economic
Development Council (LEDC), Canopy South and
the 24th Street Business Improvement District as
part of a three-year capacity building program called
Equity Impact Investments. This U.S. Economic
Development Administration program is intended to
boost economic development in underrepresented
communities.

The group's work brings together diverse community stakeholders to foster equitable growth and unity throughout Douglas County by sharing knowledge and resource coordination as ways to address key urban challenges. They have also provided stakeholder feedback for MAPA's Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS).

n June, staff from the Greater Omaha Chamber,
City of Omaha, LEDC and MAPA attended the
Learn, Explore, Active in Place (LEAP) economic
development conference in Cleveland. The
conference focused on wealth-building and inclusive
capital for historically disinvested communities.

COMPLE ING THE PICTURE

In January, MAPA facilitated a strategic planning session for the Pottawattamie County Housing Trust Fund, which allocates funds to organizations and providers which serve the housing needs of low-to-moderate income county residents.

Through group discussions, Pottawattamie County Housing Trust Fund board members clarified the organization's vision and developed a strategic plan with a prioritized list of activities and a timeline for implementation.

Board members are implementing initial priorities such as reviewing and updating bylaws, developing a fundraising committee, expanding marketing and outreach efforts, and developing a program impact dashboard for the agency website.

The Council Bluffs FIRST AVE Transit
Alternatives Analysis, completed in 2020
and funded by a Heartland 2050 MiniGrant, laid out options for transportation
investments along the former railroad
corridor and included an analysis of
the economic development and land
redevelopment impact of each alternative.

We are now seeing the impacts of that study coming to life!

The City of Council Bluffs has since completed the FIRST AVE trail, creating

a multimodal link to downtown Omaha and supporting opportunities for redevelopment. The 712 Initiative followed up with The Row on First, the first housing project along the renewed FIRST AVE corridor. Thanks to a partnership with the lowa West Foundation, the FIRST AVE trail will soon be home to a total of fifteen murals, showcasing the talents of local artists and transforming the corridor into a vibrant canyas.

MAPA and the City of Council

Alternatives are being examined to accommodate integration with the Omaha Streetcar and Bus Rapid Transit (ORBT) and a potential new bridge crossing over the Missouri River which connects multiple modes of transportation.







To help our members and partners tackle the shortage of affordable housing in the region, MAPA has been working to complete a regional Market Value Analysis. This data-driven tool can be used to analyze residential real estate markets, understand current housing conditions and support local decision-making in housing investments.

In February, consultants from CommunityScale toured communities in the metro to compare data inputs and assumptions made about regional housing conditions with actual housing conditions on the ground.

In May, consultants facilitated focus groups with philanthropic funders, affordable housing developers, local planners and policy makers.

MAPA's regional Market Value Analysis is expected to be completed in Fall/Winter 2025.

DISASTER RECOVERY

The MAPA region is still recovering from the impact of the 2024 tornadoes and other severe weather outbreaks. In fact, in the last two years every one of the six counties in the region had a federal disaster declaration due to damage caused by severe weather.

Because of the regional impact, MAPA is looking at ways to support more disaster recovery services to assist communities.

One effort - the Mills County Hazard Mitigation Plan - received approval from FEMA and MAPA will now be seeking adoption by all participating jurisdictions so they will be eligible for future federal disaster funding.

Construction begins in Fall 2025 on three duplexes, creating six new affordable housing units to replace some of the housing stock lost.

Minden received a Community

Development Block Grant-Disaster

Recovery award in the amount of

\$1,172,042 from the lowa Economic

Development Authority (IEDA) to
support the construction.

MAPA prepared the successful grant application and is administering the grant to construct the new homes.

MAPA assisted the City of Omaha in the development of its Priority Climate Action Plan (PCAP).

The plan focuses on ways to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and other harmful air pollution in the eight-county Omaha-Council Bluffs Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA).

MAPA conducted broad regional public engagement, developed a regional Greenhouse Gas Inventory for the plan, and facilitated discussions to ensure local priority projects were included in the plan and eligible for federal implementation funding.

In June, Engagement and Housing & Development Committee members participated in a North Omaha Legacy Tour. Attendees learned about the rich cultural history and legacy of this predominantly African-American community.














MAPA hosted staff from the Indianapolis Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), for a peer exchange.





Like MAPA, the Indy MPO plans and programs federal transportation funds for a variety of regional projects such as roads, transit, trails and pedestrian infrastructure.

During the peer exchange, MAPA staff shared information about the agency's structure, projects and programs and arranged tours of regional community development projects.

MAPA's relationship with the Indy MPO began in 2022 when the MPO hosted a Heartland 2050 Learning Site Visit.

HEARTLAND 2050 MINI-GRANTS

Each year MAPA earmarks a portion of its Surface Transportation Block Grant funding for the Heartland 2050 Mini-Grant Program.

The Mini-Grant Program funds projects that support local governments in their

efforts to create vibrant communities and help implement the Heartland 2050 Regional Vision.

Since its inception in 2018, the program has awarded more than \$1.96 million for 16 projects.



Work has included raising awareness about many topics:


- Increasing prevalence of fires in waste management equipment and facilities caused by lithium batteries and legislation to regulate disposal and recycling of these batteries


